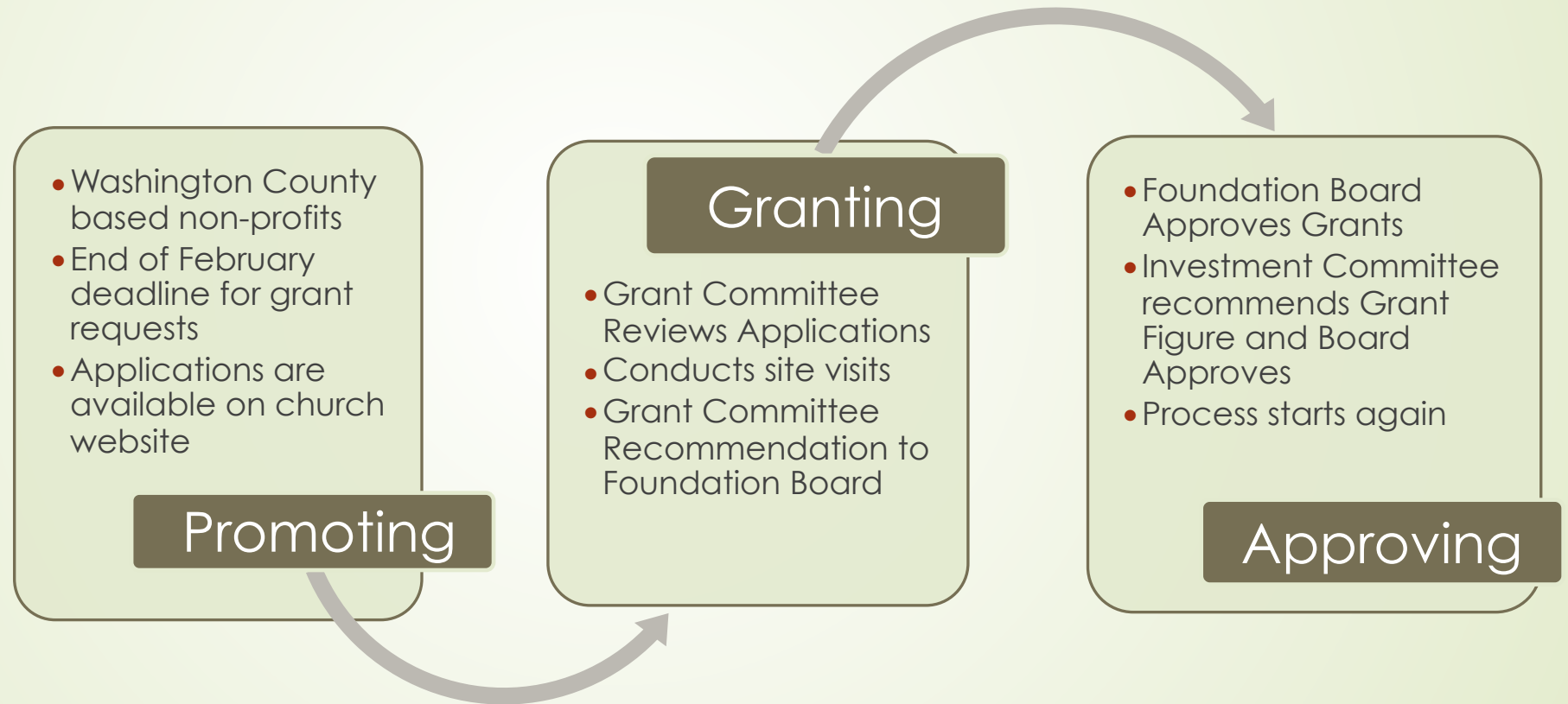

Foundation Basics



- Established 1979 with \$250,000 Donation
- Principal is invested. Some gains are retained to grow the principal
- The Foundation monies are in two funds - Mission and Outreach Fund and Southminster Fund
- The purpose of the Mission and Outreach Fund is to advance the mission of Southminster Presbyterian Church through community outreach programs outside the Church, i.e. the grant program
- The purpose of the Southminster Fund is to support building needs and membership programs within the Church
- Church members are Foundation members
- Board meetings are open to all church members
- Foundation governance is separate from the church
- Governed by 12-person Board

Grant Process



2018 Foundation Grants



- Grantees are eligible for funds 2 years in a row
- Preference to Washington County-based organizations
- Strong consideration for food, shelter, medical care and poverty needs
- \$13,000 in grants in 2018
- Grantees provide a quarterly report on use of grant funds
- \$12,600 for annual grant to Southminster

1. Rockcreek Food Pantry

\$1,000



- Operated by Rock Creek Community Church
- In 2017 distributed over 1.2 million pounds of food
- Served over 2,000 meals, and provides school backpacks
- Grant funds will purchase food for needy families

2. Southwest Community Health

\$1,000



- ▶ Provides medical care for low-income uninsured individuals with one or more chronic diseases
- ▶ Provided 2,661 visits with 1,324 individuals in 2017
- ▶ Greatest issues are diabetes, hypertension, and or mental illness issues.
- ▶ Grant funds will purchase medications for the above conditions.

3. Los Niños Cuentan \$1,500



- ▶ Provides prevention of family violence within the Latino community for over 17 years
- ▶ Provides support/shelter/housing for domestic and sexual assault victims and their children
- ▶ Grant funds will assist with the purchase of housing vouchers for families in crisis

4. Viva Village

\$800



- ▶ Provides services, programs and support for seniors who want to stay in their own homes
- ▶ Currently has 78 members and 75 active volunteers
- ▶ Is part of Villages NW, which includes 6 villages with 450 members and provided 2,700 services in 2017
- ▶ Grant funds will provide membership fee support for Beaverton seniors who are below the federal poverty level

5. Community Action Organization

\$2,000



- ▶ Acts as a safety net to ensure families who have received a 72-hour eviction notice do not become homeless
- ▶ In 2017 served 147 households and 10,135 Beaverton residents
- ▶ Grant funds will be used for needy families' rent assistance payments to prevent homelessness

6. Forest Grove UCC

\$1,000



- ▶ Operates an overnight Severe Weather Shelter and provides 2 hot meals for 25-35 homeless adults and families
- ▶ This year provided shelter and meals for a total of 1,600 overnight stays
- ▶ Grant funds will purchase countertop warmers for food service

7. Just Compassion East Washington County \$1,500



- ▶ Provides an extensive one-stop resource day center for homeless adults in East Washington County
- ▶ Aids homeless by providing resources for shelter, food, showers, laundry, etc.
- ▶ Oversees the severe weather shelter for the City of Beaverton
- ▶ Grant funds will go to expand their Homeless Advocacy Team to transition people from homelessness

8. Voices Set Free \$1,000



- ▶ Provides counseling and services to low-income children experiencing family violence and trauma
- ▶ Provides assistance navigating the legal and social welfare systems
- ▶ Prevents retraumatization and foster family resiliency
- ▶ Grant funds will pay for counselors to assist families

9. Aloha Church of God Food Pantry \$1,500



- Provides food in a shopping style format, based on family size and dietary needs
- In existence for over 17+ years
- Served 1,711 families and 6,294 people in 2017
- Grant funds will purchase items not available from the Oregon Food Bank

10. Raleigh Park Elementary School (Backpack Program)

\$750



- Provides weekend food for low-income families
- Will provide 1,024 backpacks over the school year
- 38% of Raleigh students qualify for the program
- Grant funds will purchase food for needy families

11. Community Hands Up \$1,000



- ▶ Operated by All Saints Episcopal Church
- ▶ In 2017 served 757 families, for a total of 3,317 people - 40,000+ pounds of food
- ▶ Grant funds will purchase additional food so clients can access the pantry twice a month
