HURRICANE MARIA, 2017

On September 20, 2017, Hurricane Maria struck Puerto Rico, devastating the island and plunging all of its 3.4 million residents into a desperate humanitarian crisis.

Around 130,000 Puerto Ricans have left home as a direct result of Maria's devastation.

As of June 2018, thousands of families were still displaced, living in shelters, with friends or relatives, or at hotels with assistance from FEMA. There are still many families living under the shelter of temporary blue tarps. Others are just beginning the slow process of reconstruction, as rebuilding materials are expensive and have been in short supply. While most people have regained access to basic essentials at this point, the road to recovery is long, and many residents still need help.

TRAVEL REQUIREMENTS



WHAT DOCUMENTS WILL I NEED TO TRAVEL?

U.S. citizens traveling to Puerto Rico need only a government-issued form of photo identification. Acceptable forms of ID include a driver's license, a photo ID card, or a U.S. passport. Americans don't need a visa to enter or exit Puerto Rico.

INSURANCE

All medical care is the sole responsibility of the individual. Each individual needs to be covered by domestic medical insurance and it is recommended that individuals carry additional travel insurance.

IMMUNIZATIONS

As with all mission trips, it is essential that volunteers are up to date on all immunizations. Please check with your primary health care provider on the status of your vaccinations. **Each volunteer must also have a tetanus shot.**

SAFETY & DRESS CODE REQUIREMENTS + A PACKING LIST

It'll be important for us to respect the dress code of the Lutheran Camp Eduardo Roig. On work sites, they ask that we wear long pants (jeans or work pants), long-sleeved shirts, close-toed shoes, and personal protective equipment. Off work sites, we can wear shorts and t-shirts, but we must avoid tank tops and shorts must be no more than 5 inches above the knee.
